1 Kirk Ferentz's 162 wins in all games coached as a member of the Big Ten Conference tie Joe Paterno for 5th all-time in league history. He is one of 5 coaches in B1G history to win at least 150 games as a member of the conference. The top five includes Woody Hayes (202), Amos Alonzo Stagg (199), Bo Schembechler (194), Joe Paterno (162), and Ferentz (162).

2 Iowa has won five of its last seven Big Ten openers. Iowa is opening the season against a conference opponent for the first time since 1980. The Hawkeyes opened that season with a 16-7 win at Indiana.

3 QB Spencer Petras is expected to be the fifth Hawkeye quarterback under Ferentz to make his first career start on opening day. The others are 3-1. Petras has 11 career pass attempts (6-11, 25 yards, 0 TD, 0 INT).

4 Iowa returns its top seven pass catchers from 2019. The group combined for 216 receptions, 2,681 yards, and 15 touchdowns. Those numbers include 89 percent of last year's total receptions, 90 percent of last year's receiving yards, and 94 percent of last year's receiving touchdowns.

5 Since 1999, both of Kirk Ferentz's Big Ten championships have been with a first-year starting quarterback. Brad Banks led Iowa to a share of the conference title in 2002, and Drew Tate did the same in 2004. In 2015, first-year starter C.J. Beathard was given the keys to the offense and drove Iowa to the Big Ten championship game and Rose Bowl.

6 WR Ihmir Smith-Marsette returns as the top kickoff returner in Big Ten history. Smith-Marsette averages 29.9 yards on 45 career kickoff returns, the best in school history and the best in Big Ten history.

7 RB Tyler Goodson has rushed for a touchdown in four straight games, dating back to 2019. The last Hawkeye to rush for a touchdown in five straight games was Mark Weisman, who went seven straight games with a rushing touchdown in 2014.

8 K Keith Duncan enters 2020 as Iowa's all-time career leader in field goal percentage (84.4). He has made 38-of-45 career field goal attempts. He led the country with a Big Ten single-season record 29 field goals made in 2019, and was a consensus first-team All-American, the 26th in program history. He was one of three finalists for the Lou Groza Award.

9 The Hawkeyes had 12 interceptions in 2019, and have 53 interceptions since 2017, more than any other team over the last three years.

10 Iowa is 97-32-2 (.748) in season-opening games, including a 18-3 mark under coach Kirk Ferentz. The Hawkeyes have won six straight season openers and are 18-1 since 2001.

PETRAS TO MAKE FIRST CAREER START ON OPENING DAY

QB Spencer Petras is expected to be the fifth Hawkeye quarterback under Ferentz to make his first career start on opening day. The others are 3-1.

Iowa enters the season with a quarterback room that has a combined zero career starts and 11 career pass attempts. Sophomore Spencer Petras owns all 11 career pass attempts. He was 0-1 as a true freshman in 2018, and 6-10 for 25 yards as a redshirt freshman in 2019. He has no career touchdowns or interceptions in three career games played.

Since 1999, both of Kirk Ferentz's Big Ten championships have been with a first-year starting quarterback. Brad Banks led Iowa to a share of the conference title in 2002, and Drew Tate did the same in 2004. In 2015, first-year starter C.J. Beathard was given the keys to the offense and drove Iowa to the Big Ten championship game and Rose Bowl.

Ferentz teams have also finished in the Associated Press top-10 on five occasions, and in four of those seasons the Hawkeyes were led by a first-year starter -- Banks in 2002, Nathan Chandler in 2003, Tate in 2004, and Beathard in 2015.

NEW DRIVER, EXPERIENCED WHEELS

Iowa returns its top seven pass catchers from 2019, including wide receivers Nico Ragaini, Brandon Smith, Ihmir Smith-Marsette, and Tyrone Tracy; running backs Tyler Goodson and Mekhi Sargent; and tight end Sam LaPorta. The group combined for 216 receptions, 2,681 yards, and 15 touchdowns. Those numbers include 89 percent of last year's total receptions, 90 percent of last year's receiving yards, and 94 percent of last year's receiving touchdowns.

HAWKEYE HISTORY

Iowa has played 1,259 games since beginning football in 1889. Iowa's overall record is 660-560-39 (.540). That includes a 411-222-16 (.646) record in home games, a 248-338-23 (.426) record in games away from Iowa City, a 335-381-25 (.469) mark in Big Ten games and a 295-187-15 (.609) record in Kinnick Stadium.

FRIDAY NIGHT LIGHTS

The Big Ten Conference announced Oct. 12 that Iowa will play two Friday games in 2020. The Hawkeyes defend Floyd of Rosedale under the lights at Minnesota on Nov. 13 at 6 p.m. (CT). Iowa defends the Heroes Trophy two weeks later on Nov. 27, hosting Nebraska at Kinnick Stadium. That kickoff time has not yet been announced.

BLACK FRIDAY

Iowa and Nebraska will meet on Black Friday, the day after Thanksgiving, for the 10th consecutive season. The schools have played on Black Friday every year since Nebraska joined the Big Ten Conference in 2011. That streak was originally scheduled to end 2020. The Big Ten Conference announced in 2017 that the teams will move off of their Black Friday date in 2020 and 2021. The 2020 schedule was twice altered due to the COVID 19 pandemic. Iowa is scheduled to close the 2021 season against Wisconsin, while Nebraska will close the regular season against Minnesota.



HEAD COACH KIRK FERENTZ

Kirk Ferentz (pronounced FAIR-rintz, rhymes with parents) enters his 22nd season as head coach at Iowa. He is the dean of NCAA Division I football coaches and is Iowa's all-time winningest coach, surpassing Hayden Fry in 2019. His contract runs through the 2025 season.



- Named Big Ten Coach of the Year for the fourth time in his career (2002, 2004, 2009, 2015). Only Michigan's Bo Schembechler (6) has more conference coach of the year awards.
- Guided Iowa to Big Ten titles in 2002 and 2004, and the Big Ten West Division title in 2015.
- Named Woody Hayes, Eddie Robinson, and Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year in 2015. Was a finalist for the Maxwell Football Club, Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year award.
- Ferentz is tied for fourth all-time with 162 overall wins as a member of the Big Ten. He has 97 Big Ten wins, which ranks fourth all-time.
- Named the 2002 Associated Press and Walter Camp National Coach of the Year and AFCA Regional Coach of the Year.
- Iowa has made two BCS bowl appearances, including a 24-14 win in the 2010 FedEx Orange Bowl, and one CFP Bowl (2016).
- Iowa has played in 11 January bowl games with five January bowl victories (2004 Outback Bowl, 2005 Capital One Bowl, 2009 Outback Bowl, 2010 FedEx Orange Bowl, 2019 Outback Bowl).
- Iowa has posted a 153-83 (.648) overall mark and an 93-61 (.604) Big Ten record since 2001. Ferentz has placed in the top one-half of the conference 14 times, including Big Ten titles in 2002 and 2004, a second-place finish in 2009, and a West Division title in 2015.
- At Iowa, Ferentz holds an overall record of 162-104 (.609) and a 97-75 (.564) mark in Big Ten games. He is Iowa's all-time winningest football coach with 162 wins. In 24 seasons as a college head coach, he holds a career mark of 174-125 (.582).
- The only Division I head coach to coach three sons at the same college. Brian, an assistant coach since 2012 and Iowa's offensive coordinator, was a Hawkeye letterman from 2003-05. James was a three-year starter on the Hawkeye offensive line before graduating in May, 2013. Steven was a senior offensive lineman in 2016.

FERENTZ MOVES UP BIG TEN CHARTS

Head coach Kirk Ferentz has 97 Big Ten wins as Iowa's head coach, the fourth most of any coach in Big Ten Conference history.

Ferentz's 162 wins in all games coached as a member of the Big Ten Conference tie Joe Paterno for fifth all-time in league history. He is one of five coaches in Big Ten Conference history to win at least 150 games as a member of the Big Ten Conference. The top five includes Woody Hayes (202), Amos Alonzo Stagg (199), Bo Schembechler (194), Joe Paterno (162), and Ferentz (162).

Ferentz (162-103) became Iowa's all-time winningest coach on Sept. 1, 2018. The Hawkeyes defeated Northern Illinois, 33-7. It was Ferentz's 144th win as Iowa's head coach, one more than his predecessor, Hayden Fry (143-89-6). Fry coached Iowa for 20 years (1979-98). Ferentz is in his 22nd season in 2020.

Both Ferentz (162, 97) and Fry (143, 96) rank in the top five in overall wins and Big Ten wins. Only Iowa and Michigan have two coaches ranked in the top 10 of both win categories (Bo Schembechler 194, 143; and Lloyd Carr 122, 81). Iowa is the only school in the country to have just two head football coaches since 1979.

FERENTZ TOPS IN LONGEVITY

Kirk Ferentz enters his 22nd season as Iowa's head football coach in 2020. He is the longest tenured active head coach in college football. Ferentz was named Iowa head coach on Dec. 2, 1998. Gary Patterson of TCU is No. 2 in coaching tenure. Patterson's first year with the Horned Frogs was 2001. Among Big Ten coaches, only Pat Fitzgerald (2006) has been at his current school for 10 seasons or more. Iowa is the only school to have just two head football coaches since 1979.

Defensive coordinator Phil Parker enters his 22nd season on Iowa's staff, his ninth as defensive coordinator. He is the longest tenured defensive coordinator in FBS.

Quarterbacks coach Ken O'Keefe was on Ferentz's original coaching staff before he left for the NFL following the 2011 season. He returned to Iowa in 2017 to coach Iowa's quarterbacks.

Ferentz is the only Division I coach to coach three sons. Brian Ferentz, a former Hawkeye letterman and captain (2003-05), enters his eighth season on Iowa's coaching staff. James Ferentz was a three-year starter on the Hawkeye offensive line and a team captain before graduating in 2013. Steven was an offensive lineman and letterwinner in 2015 and 2016.

REINVENTING THE STADIUM WAVE

The University of Iowa football program received the prestigious 2017 Disney Sports Spirit Award after launching a tradition at its home games that touched the lives of scores of young patients at the University's Stead Family Children's Hospital.

In a tradition that started at the 2017 season opener, players, coaches, and fans inside Kinnick Stadium exchange waves at the end of the first quarter with patients and families inside the UI Stead Family Children's Hospital. The tradition will continue in 2020, with limited fans inside Kinnick Stadium.

The UI Stead Family Children's Hospital opened in 2017. It is connected to the south end of the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics and overlooks Kinnick Stadium from the southeast grandstands. During Iowa football home games, patients and their families can watch the game from the top floor (Level 12), one of the highest vantage points in Iowa City.

THE SERIES

Purdue holds a 48-39-3 advantage in the series that began with a 16-0 Iowa win in 1910.

The Hawkeyes have won five of the last seven meetings, 10 of the last 14, and four of their last five visits to Purdue. Iowa is 17-28-1 all-time in games played in West Lafayette.

Iowa and the Boilermakers battled to a 21-21 tie at West Lafayette in 1994. That game marks the last tie game for Iowa before the college football tie-breaker system was put in place. Here are the series results:

BIG TEN BOWL GAMES SINCE 2001

Iowa has posted a 9-8 bowl record under head coach Kirk Ferentz, and has won its last three bowl games, tying its longest such streak in program history. Ferentz's nine bowl wins tie Barry Alvarez for second in Big Ten history (Joe Paterno, 10).

The Hawkeyes have been bowl eligible 18 times in the last 19 seasons.

Since the 2001 season, only Ohio State (10) has more bowl wins (including FCS Playoffs and the BCS championship game), than Iowa. The following is the record for Big Ten teams in bowl games since 2001:

IN THE RANKINGS

Iowa finished the 2019 season ranked No. 15 in both the AP poll and the coaches poll. It marked the 25th time in program history that Iowa finished the season ranked in the top 25. Iowa has finished ranked 15th or better in the AP poll six times in 21 seasons under head coach Kirk Ferentz.

Iowa's 2020 schedule includes three opponents ranked in the AP top 25 (#9 Penn State, #16 Wisconsin, #24 Minnesota).

TROPHY COLLECTION

The Hawkeyes have three trophy games on the 2020 schedule, including Nov. 13 at Minnesota, Nov. 27 vs. Nebraska, and Dec. 12 vs. Wisconsin. Iowa will not get a chance to defend the Cy-Hawk Trophy due to the Big Ten's decision to play a conference-only schedule.

The Hawkeyes were 4-1 in trophy games in 2019, including 3-1 in rivalry games and 1-0 in the postseason. Iowa defended the Cy-Hawk Trophy at Iowa State, the Floyd of Rosedale trophy against #7 Minnesota, and the Heroes Trophy at Nebraska. The Hawkeyes fell at #16 Wisconsin in a battle for the Heartland Trophy.

The Hawkeyes are 16-4 in their last 20 rivalry trophy games (Iowa State, Minnesota, Nebraska, Wisconsin), with all four losses coming to Wisconsin, and have won three straight bowl games.

RETURN TO SENDER

Senior WR Ihmir Smith-Marsette returns as the top kickoff returner in Big Ten history. Smith-Marsette averages 29.9 yards on 45 career kickoff returns, the best in school and Big Ten history. Smith-Marsette has 1,344 kickoff return yards, fifth all-time in program history.

In 2019, Smith-Marsette became the first player in school history to return two kickoffs for a touchdown in the same season. He did it in consecutive games to end the season. He had a 95-yard kickoff return for a touchdown against Nebraska, tying for the 10th longest in school history, and a 98-yard return against USC at the Holiday Bowl, the seventh longest in school history, an Iowa bowl record, and tying a Holiday Bowl record.

Smith-Marsette is Iowa's top returner in receiving yards (722) and all-purpose yards (1,333), and ranked second on the team in receptions (44). He had a team-high 10 touchdowns; five receiving, three rushing, and two kickoff returns. He set a career high with 121 receiving yards in Week 11, his second career 100-yard receiving game (Rutgers, 113).

Smith-Marsette has 1,270 career receiving yards, 30th all-time in program history. He has 2,834 all-purpose yards, 17th all-time.

Smith-Marsette scored three touchdowns at the 2019 Holiday Bowl (all in the first half), tying Shonn Greene's Iowa bowl record. He is the second Hawkeye in program history to score a touchdown via rush, reception, and kickoff return, in a single game (George Rice, vs. Purdue in 1951). He is the first college player since 1998 (Deuce McAllister, Independence Bowl) to score a touchdown via rush, reception, kickoff return in a bowl game.

GOODSON LEADS GROUND GAME

RB Tyler Goodson started the final four games of 2020 and became the first true freshman in program history to lead the team in single-season rushing yards (638). The last redshirt freshman to lead Iowa in single-season rushing yards was Ladell Betts in 1998 (679 yards). Goodson led the team with five rushing touchdowns, and had 24 receptions for 166 yards. His 158 combined touches led the team.

In Iowa's 23-19 win against #7 Minnesota in Week 10, Goodson became the first true freshman to start at running back under Ferentz since 2012 (Greg Garmon).

Goodson has rushed for a touchdown in four straight games, dating back to 2019. He is the first Hawkeye to rush for a touchdown in four straight games since Akrum Wadley in 2016. The last Hawkeye to rush for a touchdown in five straight games was Mark Weisman, who went seven straight games with a rushing touchdown in 2014.

DUNCAN GETTING HIS KICKS

Senior K Keith Duncan enters 2020 as Iowa's all-time career leader in field goal percentage (84.4). He has made 38-of-45 career field goal attempts. He led the country with a Big Ten single-season record 29 field goals made in 2019, and was a consensus first-team All-American, the 26th in program history. Duncan was named the Bakken-Anderson Kicker of the Year in the Big Ten Conference in 2019, and was one of three finalists for the Lou Groza Award.

Duncan has two game-winning field goals in his career. He kicked a 33-yard field goal as time expired to defeat No. 2 Michigan, 14-13, at home in 2016. He connected on a 48-yard attempt to give Iowa a 27-24 lead with one second left at Nebraska in 2019.

DEFENSE RANKS AMONG NATION'S BEST

Senior Chauncey Golston returns to lead a defense that ranked in the top 20 in scoring, rushing, passing, and total defense in 2019. Iowa was fifth in the country in scoring defense (14.0 ppg), 12th in total defense (308.2 ypg), 14th in rushing defense (112.5), and 19th in passing defense (195.7 ypg). The Hawkeyes held seven-of-13 opponents to their season-low point total. Golston is the lone returning among the front four. He led the Big Ten and ranked sixth in the nation with three fumble recoveries last season.

Iowa's scoring defense (14.0) was the second lowest total of the Ferentz era (13.0 in 2008). The Hawkeyes allowed just 16.6 first downs per game, 12th fewest in the country and third in the Big Ten, and just 21 touchdowns, third fewest in the country (San Diego State 19, Georgia 20).

GOING THE OTHER WAY

The Hawkeyes intercepted at least one pass in the final seven games of the 2019 season, including a 25-yard interception return for a touchdown by LB Ben Niemann at the 2019 Holiday Bowl. Niemann's interception was the first of his career, Iowa's final score of the season, and extended the Hawkeyes' streak with a pick-six to 12 consecutive seasons. Iowa has had at least one interception returned for a touchdown in 17 of the last 19 seasons.

The Hawkeyes had 12 interceptions in 2019, and have 53 interceptions since 2017, more than any other team over the last three years.

The Iowa secondary returns two starters in cornerback Matt Hankins and safety Jack Koerner. In addition, Dane Belton started four games at the "cash" position last year as a true freshman. He is expected to split time between "cash" and safety to start the season.

BIG TEN PERFECTION

University of Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz has twice navigated the Big Ten regular season schedule with an undefeated record. The Hawkeyes were 8-0 in 2002 and shared the Big Ten championship with Ohio State. The Hawkeyes were 8-0 in 2015, winning the Big Ten West Division title.

Since 1954, when the conference schedule expanded to seven games, only six Big Ten coaches, including Ferentz, have multiple undefeated Big Ten seasons.

BACK ON CAMPUS

Three former players are on the University of Iowa football staff in 2019. Brian Ferentz, a three-year letterman from 2003-05, enters his ninth year on staff, his fourth as offensive coordinator.

LeVar Woods, a three-year letterman from 1998-2000, enters his 13th year on the Iowa staff. Woods was named Special Teams Coordinator in 2017. He coached tight ends from 2015-17 and linebackers from 2012-14. He rejoined the program as an administrative assistant in 2008.

Kelvin Bell joined the Iowa program as a defensive lineman in 2000, but had his career cut short due to injury. He returned to the program as a graduate assistant and served as director of on-campus recruiting from 2012-13. He was named recruiting coordinator and defensive assistant coach in February, 2016, and was named defensive line coach in 2019.

Iowa has one set of the brothers on the team: TE Bryce Schulte and WR Quinn Schulte.

Iowa has four players whose brothers played at Iowa: Zach Kluver (Tyler in 2013-17), Nathan Nelson (Anthony in 2015-18), LB Nick Niemann (Ben in 2014-17), and FB Johnny Plewa (Macon in 2013-15).

LS Austin Spiewak is the grandson of Gary Grouwinkel, who played for Iowa in the 1957 and 1959 Rose Bowl games.

2 HAWKEYES OPT OUT OF 2020

Junior Djimon Colbert and redshirt freshman Taajhir McCall have elected to opt out of the 2020 football season due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Colbert is a junior linebacker from Shawnee, Mission, Kansas. He started all 13 games at linebacker in 2019 and ranked fourth on the team with 61 tackles. McCall is a redshirt freshman defensive lineman from Pensacola, Florida. He did not see action in 2019.

IOWA PROGRAM NOTES

- Iowa had 47 wins from 2015-19, the most of any five-year period in school history.
- Only nine schools have won more games than the Hawkeyes (47) since 2015. They include Clemson (68), Alabama (66), Ohio State (60), Oklahoma (57), Georgia (54), Wisconsin (52), Penn State (51), and LSU (50).
- The Hawkeyes earned bowl eligibility in 18 of the last 19 seasons. Iowa is 9-8 in bowl games since 2001. Only Ohio State (10) has more bowl wins among Big Ten teams since 2001. The Hawkeyes are 17-15-1 in 33 bowl games. Iowa has won five January bowl games under Ferentz.
- Iowa is the only school to have two head football coaches since 1979. Hayden Fry took over prior to the 1979 season and coached through the 1998 season, posting a record of 143-89-6. Current coach Kirk Ferentz (162-104) replaced Fry and completed his 21st season in 2019. Ferentz also served as Iowa's offensive line coach from 1981-89 under Fry.
- Iowa played in the Big Ten title game for the first time in program history on Dec. 5, 2015. Iowa earned Big Ten Conference championships in 2002 and 2004 and placed second in 2009. Iowa (8-0, 2002; 8-0, 2015) is one of three Big Ten teams to post a perfect mark in conference play since 1998 (BCS era), joining Michigan State (1) and Ohio State (5).
- Iowa has ranked in the top 10 in the final Associated Press and CNN/USA Today coaches polls five times since 2002, including a ranking of seventh in both polls at the conclusion of the 2009 season. Iowa ranked eighth in 2002, 2003 and 2004. The Hawkeyes finished 2015 ranked ninth in the AP poll and 10th in the USA Today Coaches Poll. In the Big Ten, only Ohio State has more top 10 finishes since 2002.
- Since 1936 when the first AP poll was released, Iowa has appeared in the poll 334 times, the fifth highest total in the Big Ten (Ohio State, Michigan, Wisconsin, and MSU). Iowa has been the top-ranked team in the country 11 times.
- Iowa set a school record with 12 wins in 2015. The Hawkeyes won 11 games in 2002 (11-2), and 2009 (11-2). In 2009, Iowa started 9-0 and won 10 regular season games for just the fourth time in school history.
- Iowa won 10 or more games in three consecutive years (2002-04) for the first time in school history.
- Kirk Ferentz has been named Big Ten Coach of the Year four times (2002, 2004, 2009, 2015) and was named National Coach of the Year in 2002 and 2015. Only Michigan's Bo Schembechler (6) has more conference coach of the year honors. Iowa's Hayden Fry and Penn State's Joe Paterno both won the award three times.
- Iowa has had 10 individual national award winners under head coach Kirk Ferentz. They include Brad Banks (2002 Davey O'Brien, Top Quarterback; 2002 Associated Press National Player of the Year); Dallas Clark (2002 Mackey, Top Tight End); Nate Kaeding (2002 Groza, Top Kicker); Robert Gallery (2003 Outland, Top Lineman); Shonn Greene (2008 Doak Walker, Top Running Back); Brandon Scherff (2014 Outland, Top Lineman), Desmond King (2015 Jim Thorpe), Josey Jewell (2017 Lott IMPACT), T.J. Hockenson (2018, Mackey, Top Tight End).
- Iowa's offensive line earned the Joe Moore Award in 2016, an honor bestowed upon the top offensive line unit in the country.
- Iowa's football record in the 2000 decade was 80-45 (.640), a record that ranks as the best decade in Iowa football history, based on total wins. Iowa posted a record of 77-40-4 (.652) during the 1980's and the Hawkeyes were 62-53-2 (.538) in the 1990's. Iowa was 81-49 (.623) from 2010-19.



HAWKEYES IN THE NFL

Iowa football players have a long tradition of being well prepared for professional football following their college playing careers. Since 2010, 42 Hawkeyes have been selected in the NFL Draft. Today, 29 Hawkeyes are on NFL active rosters and five on practice teams.

IOWA FOOTBALL AND THE NFL

- The Hawkeyes have had 188 former players in the NFL since 1999, Kirk Ferentz's first year as head coach (75 draft picks/113 free agents).
At least one Iowa Hawkeye has been selected in every NFL Draft since 1978 (43 consecutive years).
TE T.J. Hockenson (eighth overall, Detroit) and TE Noah Fant (20th overall, Denver) became the first tight ends from the same school to be drafted in the first round of a single NFL Draft (2019).
TE George Kittle (San Francisco) was a first-team All-Pro in 2019. OL Marshal Yanda (Baltimore) was named second-team All-Pro.
DB Desmond King (Los Angeles Chargers), LS Casey Kreiter (Denver), TE George Kittle (San Francisco), and OL Marshal Yanda (Baltimore) were named All-Pro in 2018.
Over the past 19 years, 155-of-180 (88 percent) of Iowa's senior starters have been drafted in the NFL or signed NFL free agent contracts.
Over the past 13 years, Iowa has had 49 NFL Draft picks, tied for third most in the Big Ten -- Ohio State (73), Michigan (55), Wisconsin (49).
Iowa has had seven first round picks in the last 10 NFL drafts -- OL Bryan Bulaga, 2010; DE Adrian Clayborn, 2011; OL Riley Reiff, 2012; OL Brandon Scherff, 2015, TE T.J. Hockenson, TE Noah Fant, 2019; OL Tristan Wirfs, 2020.
Iowa had six players drafted in the 2012 NFL Draft, which tied for the most in the Big Ten and tied for fourth in the country.
Former Hawkeye Marshal Yanda (Baltimore OL) is an eight-time Pro-Bowler (2011-16, 2018, 2019) and was named NFL All-Pro in 2011, 2012, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2018, 2019. He retired following the 2019 season.
In NFL 2011 regular season statistics, former Hawkeye linebackers Chad Greenway (Minnesota) and Pat Angerer (Indianapolis) finished third and fourth, respectively, in tackles. Greenway was named to the Pro Bowl in 2012 and 2013.
Three former Hawkeyes were involved in the 2012 Super Bowl. DB Tyler Sash played for the Super Bowl champion New York Giants, while LB Jeff Tarpinian was on the injured reserve roster of the New England Patriots. Former Iowa center Brian Ferentz, now is his seventh year on staff and first as Iowa's offensive coordinator, was New England's tight ends coach.
Former Iowa DB Sean Considine and OL Marshal Yanda won Super Bowl rings with the 2012 Baltimore Ravens in the 2013 Super Bowl.
Former Iowa LB James Morris (injured reserve) earned a Super Bowl ring with the New England Patriots in 2015. Former TE Tony Moeaki played for the Seattle Seahawks in the same game.
Former center James Ferentz was a member of the 2016 Super Bowl champion Denver Broncos.
Former DT Jonathan Babineaux played for the Atlanta Falcons in Super Bowl LI. Former DE Adrian Clayborn and former DB Charles Godfrey were on the Atlanta injured reserve roster.
Former OL Cole Croston was on the New England Patriots roster in Super Bowl LII. Former C James Ferentz and WR Riley McCarron were on the Patriots practice squad.
Former DL Adrian Clayborn (active), OL James Ferentz, WR Riley McCarron (injured reserve), and OL Cole Croston (practice squad) earned Super Bowl rings as members of the New England Patriots in Super Bowl LIII.
Former LB Anthony Hitchens and LB Ben Niemann played for the Super Bowl champion Kansas City Chiefs in 2020. Former QB C.J. Beathard, TE George Kittle, and OL Ross Reynolds were on the NFC Champion San Francisco 49ers.
Entering the 2020 season, every Iowa senior starting tight end (15) under Kirk Ferentz has been drafted in the NFL or signed by an NFL team. The NFL has employed 17 Iowa tight ends since 1999 (11 drafted/6 free agents).
All 11 members of Iowa's starting defensive unit in 2008 were either drafted or signed to NFL free agent contracts following the draft.

PETRAS TO MAKE FIRST CAREER START ON OPENING DAY

QB Spencer Petras is expected to be the fifth Hawkeye quarterback under Ferentz to make his first career start on opening day. The others are 3-1.

Iowa enters the season with a quarterback room that has a combined zero career starts and 11 career pass attempts. Sophomore Spencer Petras owns all 11 career pass attempts. He was 0-1 as a true freshman in 2018, and 6-10 for 25 yards as a redshirt freshman in 2019. He has no career touchdowns or interceptions in three career games played.

Since 1999, both of Kirk Ferentz's Big Ten championships have been with a first-year starting quarterback. Brad Banks led Iowa to a share of the conference title in 2002, and Drew Tate did the same in 2004. In 2015, first-year starter C.J. Beathard was given the keys to the offense and drove Iowa to the Big Ten championship game and Rose Bowl.

Ferentz teams have also finished in the Associated Press top-10 on five occasions, and in four of those seasons the Hawkeyes were led by a first-year starter -- Banks in 2002, Nathan Chandler in 2003, Tate in 2004, and Beathard in 2015.

NEW DRIVER, EXPERIENCED WHEELS

Iowa returns its top seven pass catchers from 2019, including wide receivers Nico Ragaini, Brandon Smith, Ihmir Smith-Marsette, and Tyrone Tracy; running backs Tyler Goodson and Mekhi Sargent; and tight end Sam LaPorta. The group combined for 216 receptions, 2,681 yards, and 15 touchdowns. Those numbers include 89 percent of last year's total receptions, 90 percent of last year's receiving yards, and 94 percent of last year's receiving touchdowns.

HAWKEYE HISTORY

Iowa has played 1,259 games since beginning football in 1889. Iowa's overall record is 660-560-39 (.540). That includes a 411-222-16 (.646) record in home games, a 248-338-23 (.426) record in games away from Iowa City, a 335-381-25 (.469) mark in Big Ten games and a 295-187-15 (.609) record in Kinnick Stadium.

FRIDAY NIGHT LIGHTS

The Big Ten Conference announced Oct. 12 that Iowa will play two Friday games in 2020. The Hawkeyes defend Floyd of Rosedale under the lights at Minnesota on Nov. 13 at 6 p.m. (CT). Iowa defends the Heroes Trophy two weeks later on Nov. 27, hosting Nebraska at Kinnick Stadium. That kickoff time has not yet been announced.

BLACK FRIDAY

Iowa and Nebraska will meet on Black Friday, the day after Thanksgiving, for the 10th consecutive season. The schools have played on Black Friday every year since Nebraska joined the Big Ten Conference in 2011. That streak was originally scheduled to end 2020. The Big Ten Conference announced in 2017 that the teams will move off of their Black Friday date in 2020 and 2021. The 2020 schedule was twice altered due to the COVID 19 pandemic. Iowa is scheduled to close the 2021 season against Wisconsin, while Nebraska will close the regular season against Minnesota.



HEAD COACH KIRK FERENTZ

Kirk Ferentz (pronounced FAIR-rintz, rhymes with parents) enters his 22nd season as head coach at Iowa. He is the dean of NCAA Division I football coaches and is Iowa's all-time winningest coach, surpassing Hayden Fry in 2019. His contract runs through the 2025 season.



- Named Big Ten Coach of the Year for the fourth time in his career (2002, 2004, 2009, 2015). Only Michigan's Bo Schembechler (6) has more conference coach of the year awards.
- Guided Iowa to Big Ten titles in 2002 and 2004, and the Big Ten West Division title in 2015.
- Named Woody Hayes, Eddie Robinson, and Bobby Dodd Coach of the Year in 2015. Was a finalist for the Maxwell Football Club, Paul "Bear" Bryant Coach of the Year award.
- Ferentz is tied for fourth all-time with 162 overall wins as a member of the Big Ten. He has 97 Big Ten wins, which ranks fourth all-time.
- Named the 2002 Associated Press and Walter Camp National Coach of the Year and AFCA Regional Coach of the Year.
- Iowa has made two BCS bowl appearances, including a 24-14 win in the 2010 FedEx Orange Bowl, and one CFP Bowl (2016).
- Iowa has played in 11 January bowl games with five January bowl victories (2004 Outback Bowl, 2005 Capital One Bowl, 2009 Outback Bowl, 2010 FedEx Orange Bowl, 2019 Outback Bowl).
- Iowa has posted a 153-83 (.648) overall mark and an 93-61 (.604) Big Ten record since 2001. Ferentz has placed in the top one-half of the conference 14 times, including Big Ten titles in 2002 and 2004, a second-place finish in 2009, and a West Division title in 2015.
- At Iowa, Ferentz holds an overall record of 162-104 (.609) and a 97-75 (.564) mark in Big Ten games. He is Iowa's all-time winningest football coach with 162 wins. In 24 seasons as a college head coach, he holds a career mark of 174-125 (.582).
- The only Division I head coach to coach three sons at the same college. Brian, an assistant coach since 2012 and Iowa's offensive coordinator, was a Hawkeye letterman from 2003-05. James was a three-year starter on the Hawkeye offensive line before graduating in May, 2013. Steven was a senior offensive lineman in 2016.

FERENTZ MOVES UP BIG TEN CHARTS

Head coach Kirk Ferentz has 97 Big Ten wins as Iowa's head coach, the fourth most of any coach in Big Ten Conference history.

Ferentz's 162 wins in all games coached as a member of the Big Ten Conference tie Joe Paterno for fifth all-time in league history. He is one of five coaches in Big Ten Conference history to win at least 150 games as a member of the Big Ten Conference. The top five includes Woody Hayes (202), Amos Alonzo Stagg (199), Bo Schembechler (194), Joe Paterno (162), and Ferentz (162).

Ferentz (162-103) became Iowa's all-time winningest coach on Sept. 1, 2018. The Hawkeyes defeated Northern Illinois, 33-7. It was Ferentz's 144th win as Iowa's head coach, one more than his predecessor, Hayden Fry (143-89-6). Fry coached Iowa for 20 years (1979-98). Ferentz is in his 22nd season in 2020.

Both Ferentz (162, 97) and Fry (143, 96) rank in the top five in overall wins and Big Ten wins. Only Iowa and Michigan have two coaches ranked in the top 10 of both win categories (Bo Schembechler 194, 143; and Lloyd Carr 122, 81). Iowa is the only school in the country to have just two head football coaches since 1979.

FERENTZ TOPS IN LONGEVITY

Kirk Ferentz enters his 22nd season as Iowa's head football coach in 2020. He is the longest tenured active head coach in college football. Ferentz was named Iowa head coach on Dec. 2, 1998. Gary Patterson of TCU is No. 2 in coaching tenure. Patterson's first year with the Horned Frogs was 2001. Among Big Ten coaches, only Pat Fitzgerald (2006) has been at his current school for 10 seasons or more. Iowa is the only school to have just two head football coaches since 1979.

Defensive coordinator Phil Parker enters his 22nd season on Iowa's staff, his ninth as defensive coordinator. He is the longest tenured defensive coordinator in FBS.

Quarterbacks coach Ken O'Keefe was on Ferentz's original coaching staff before he left for the NFL following the 2011 season. He returned to Iowa in 2017 to coach Iowa's quarterbacks.

Ferentz is the only Division I coach to coach three sons. Brian Ferentz, a former Hawkeye letterman and captain (2003-05), enters his eighth season on Iowa's coaching staff. James Ferentz was a three-year starter on the Hawkeye offensive line and a team captain before graduating in 2013. Steven was an offensive lineman and letterwinner in 2015 and 2016.

REINVENTING THE STADIUM WAVE

The University of Iowa football program received the prestigious 2017 Disney Sports Spirit Award after launching a tradition at its home games that touched the lives of scores of young patients at the University's Stead Family Children's Hospital.

In a tradition that started at the 2017 season opener, players, coaches, and fans inside Kinnick Stadium exchange waves at the end of the first quarter with patients and families inside the UI Stead Family Children's Hospital. The tradition will continue in 2020, with limited fans inside Kinnick Stadium.

The UI Stead Family Children's Hospital opened in 2017. It is connected to the south end of the University of Iowa Hospitals and Clinics and overlooks Kinnick Stadium from the southeast grandstands. During Iowa football home games, patients and their families can watch the game from the top floor (Level 12), one of the highest vantage points in Iowa City.

THE SERIES

Purdue holds a 48-39-3 advantage in the series that began with a 16-0 Iowa win in 1910.

The Hawkeyes have won five of the last seven meetings, 10 of the last 14, and four of their last five visits to Purdue. Iowa is 17-28-1 all-time in games played in West Lafayette.

BIG TEN BOWL GAMES SINCE 2001

Iowa has posted a 9-8 bowl record under head coach Kirk Ferentz, and has won its last three bowl games, tying its longest such streak in program history. Ferentz's nine bowl wins tie Barry Alvarez for second in Big Ten history (Joe Paterno, 10).

The Hawkeyes have been bowl eligible 18 times in the last 19 seasons.

IN THE RANKINGS

Iowa finished the 2019 season ranked No. 15 in both the AP poll and the coaches poll. It marked the 25th time in program history that Iowa finished the season ranked in the top 25. Iowa has finished ranked 15th or better in the AP poll six times in 21 seasons under head coach Kirk Ferentz.

Iowa's 2020 schedule includes three opponents ranked in the AP top 25 (#9 Penn State, #16 Wisconsin, #24 Minnesota).

TROPHY COLLECTION

The Hawkeyes have three trophy games on the 2020 schedule, including Nov. 13 at Minnesota, Nov. 27 vs. Nebraska, and Dec. 12 vs. Wisconsin. Iowa will not get a chance to defend the Cy-Hawk Trophy due to the Big Ten's decision to play a conference-only schedule.

The Hawkeyes were 4-1 in trophy games in 2019, including 3-1 in rivalry games and 1-0 in the postseason. Iowa defended the Cy-Hawk Trophy at Iowa State, the Floyd of Rosedale trophy against #7 Minnesota, and the Heroes Trophy at Nebraska. The Hawkeyes fell at #16 Wisconsin in a battle for the Heartland Trophy.

The Hawkeyes are 16-4 in their last 20 rivalry trophy games (Iowa State, Minnesota, Nebraska, Wisconsin), with all four losses coming to Wisconsin, and have won three straight bowl games.

RETURN TO SENDER

Senior WR Ihmir Smith-Marsette returns as the top kickoff returner in Big Ten history. Smith-Marsette averages 29.9 yards on 45 career kickoff returns, the best in school and Big Ten history. Smith-Marsette has 1,344 kickoff return yards, fifth all-time in program history.

In 2019, Smith-Marsette became the first player in school history to return two kickoffs for a touchdown in the same season. He did it in consecutive games to end the season. He had a 95-yard kickoff return for a touchdown against Nebraska, tying for the 10th longest in school history, and a 98-yard return against USC at the Holiday Bowl, the seventh longest in school history, an Iowa bowl record, and tying a Holiday Bowl record.

Smith-Marsette is Iowa's top returner in receiving yards (722) and all-purpose yards (1,333), and ranked second on the team in receptions (44). He had a team-high 10 touchdowns; five receiving, three rushing, and two kickoff returns. He set a career high with 121 receiving yards in Week 11, his second career 100-yard receiving game (Rutgers, 113).

Smith-Marsette has 1,270 career receiving yards, 30th all-time in program history. He has 2,834 all-purpose yards, 17th all-time.

Smith-Marsette scored three touchdowns at the 2019 Holiday Bowl (all in the first half), tying Shonn Greene's Iowa bowl record. He is the second Hawkeye in program history to score a touchdown via rush, reception, and kickoff return, in a single game (George Rice, vs. Purdue in 1951). He is the first college player since 1998 (Deuce McAllister, Independence Bowl) to score a touchdown via rush, reception, kickoff return in a bowl game.

GOODSON LEADS GROUND GAME

RB Tyler Goodson started the final four games of 2020 and became the first true freshman in program history to lead the team in single-season rushing yards (638). The last redshirt freshman to lead Iowa in single-season rushing yards was Ladell Betts in 1998 (679 yards). Goodson led the team with five rushing touchdowns, and had 24 receptions for 166 yards. His 158 combined touches led the team.

In Iowa's 23-19 win against #7 Minnesota in Week 10, Goodson became the first true freshman to start at running back under Ferentz since 2012 (Greg Garmon).

Goodson has rushed for a touchdown in four straight games, dating back to 2019. He is the first Hawkeye to rush for a touchdown in four straight games since Akrum Wadley in 2016. The last Hawkeye to rush for a touchdown in five straight games was Mark Weisman, who went seven straight games with a rushing touchdown in 2014.

DUNCAN GETTING HIS KICKS

Senior K Keith Duncan enters 2020 as Iowa's all-time career leader in field goal percentage (84.4). He has made 38-of-45 career field goal attempts. He led the country with a Big Ten single-season record 29 field goals made in 2019, and was a consensus first-team All-American, the 26th in program history. Duncan was named the Bakken-Anderson Kicker of the Year in the Big Ten Conference in 2019, and was one of three finalists for the Lou Groza Award.

Duncan has two game-winning field goals in his career. He kicked a 33-yard field goal as time expired to defeat No. 2 Michigan, 14-13, at home in 2016. He connected on a 48-yard attempt to give Iowa a 27-24 lead with one second left at Nebraska in 2019.

DEFENSE RANKS AMONG NATION'S BEST

Senior Chauncey Golston returns to lead a defense that ranked in the top 20 in scoring, rushing, passing, and total defense in 2019. Iowa was fifth in the country in scoring defense (14.0 ppg), 12th in total defense (308.2 ypg), 14th in rushing defense (112.5), and 19th in passing defense (195.7 ypg). The Hawkeyes held seven-of-13 opponents to their season-low point total. Golston is the lone returning among the front four. He led the Big Ten and ranked sixth in the nation with three fumble recoveries last season.

Iowa's scoring defense (14.0) was the second lowest total of the Ferentz era (13.0 in 2008). The Hawkeyes allowed just 16.6 first downs per game, 12th fewest in the country and third in the Big Ten, and just 21 touchdowns, third fewest in the country (San Diego State 19, Georgia 20).

GOING THE OTHER WAY

The Hawkeyes intercepted at least one pass in the final seven games of the 2019 season, including a 25-yard interception return for a touchdown by LB Ben Niemann at the 2019 Holiday Bowl. Niemann's interception was the first of his career, Iowa's final score of the season, and extended the Hawkeyes' streak with a pick-six to 12 consecutive seasons. Iowa has had at least one interception returned for a touchdown in 17 of the last 19 seasons.

The Hawkeyes had 12 interceptions in 2019, and have 53 interceptions since 2017, more than any other team over the last three years.

The Iowa secondary returns two starters in cornerback Matt Hankins and safety Jack Koerner. In addition, Dane Belton started four games at the "cash" position last year as a true freshman. He is expected to split time between "cash" and safety to start the season.

BIG TEN PERFECTION

University of Iowa head coach Kirk Ferentz has twice navigated the Big Ten regular season schedule with an undefeated record. The Hawkeyes were 8-0 in 2002 and shared the Big Ten championship with Ohio State. The Hawkeyes were 8-0 in 2015, winning the Big Ten West Division title.

Since 1954, when the conference schedule expanded to seven games, only six Big Ten coaches, including Ferentz, have multiple undefeated Big Ten seasons.

BACK ON CAMPUS

Three former players are on the University of Iowa football staff in 2019. Brian Ferentz, a three-year letterman from 2003-05, enters his ninth year on staff, his fourth as offensive coordinator.

LeVar Woods, a three-year letterman from 1998-2000, enters his 13th year on the Iowa staff. Woods was named Special Teams Coordinator in 2017. He coached tight ends from 2015-17 and linebackers from 2012-14. He rejoined the program as an administrative assistant in 2008.

Kelvin Bell joined the Iowa program as a defensive lineman in 2000, but had his career cut short due to injury. He returned to the program as a graduate assistant and served as director of on-campus recruiting from 2012-13. He was named recruiting coordinator and defensive assistant coach in February, 2016, and was named defensive line coach in 2019.

HAWKEYE LEGACIES

Iowa has six players on its 2019 roster whose father played for the Hawkeyes: DE Joe Evans (Spence, 1989), DB Thomas Hartlieb (Jim, 1989-92), LS Zach Kluver (Todd), WR Henry Marchese (John, 1985), DE Nathan Nelson (Jeff, 1990-92), and LS Liam Reardon (Bill).

Iowa has one set of the brothers on the team: TE Bryce Schulte and WR Quinn Schulte.

Iowa has four players whose brothers played at Iowa: Zach Kluver (Tyler in 2013-17), Nathan Nelson (Anthony in 2015-18), LB Nick Niemann (Ben in 2014-17), and FB Johnny Plewa (Macon in 2013-15).

LS Austin Spiewak is the grandson of Gary Grouwinkel, who played for Iowa in the 1957 and 1959 Rose Bowl games.

2 HAWKEYES OPT OUT OF 2020

Junior Djimon Colbert and redshirt freshman Taajhir McCall have elected to opt out of the 2020 football season due to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Colbert is a junior linebacker from Shawnee, Mission, Kansas. He started all 13 games at linebacker in 2019 and ranked fourth on the team with 61 tackles. McCall is a redshirt freshman defensive lineman from Pensacola, Florida. He did not see action in 2019.

IOWA PROGRAM NOTES

- Iowa had 47 wins from 2015-19, the most of any five-year period in school history.
- Only nine schools have won more games than the Hawkeyes (47) since 2015. They include Clemson (68), Alabama (66), Ohio State (60), Oklahoma (57), Georgia (54), Wisconsin (52), Penn State (51), and LSU (50).
- The Hawkeyes earned bowl eligibility in 18 of the last 19 seasons. Iowa is 9-8 in bowl games since 2001. Only Ohio State (10) has more bowl wins among Big Ten teams since 2001. The Hawkeyes are 17-15-1 in 33 bowl games. Iowa has won five January bowl games under Ferentz.
- Iowa is the only school to have two head football coaches since 1979. Hayden Fry took over prior to the 1979 season and coached through the 1998 season, posting a record of 143-89-6. Current coach Kirk Ferentz (162-104) replaced Fry and completed his 21st season in 2019. Ferentz also served as Iowa's offensive line coach from 1981-89 under Fry.
- Iowa played in the Big Ten title game for the first time in program history on Dec. 5, 2015. Iowa earned Big Ten Conference championships in 2002 and 2004 and placed second in 2009. Iowa (8-0, 2002; 8-0, 2015) is one of three Big Ten teams to post a perfect mark in conference play since 1998 (BCS era), joining Michigan State (1) and Ohio State (5).
- Iowa has ranked in the top 10 in the final Associated Press and CNN/USA Today coaches polls five times since 2002, including a ranking of seventh in both polls at the conclusion of the 2009 season. Iowa ranked eighth in 2002, 2003 and 2004. The Hawkeyes finished 2015 ranked ninth in the AP poll and 10th in the USA Today Coaches Poll. In the Big Ten, only Ohio State has more top 10 finishes since 2002.
- Since 1936 when the first AP poll was released, Iowa has appeared in the poll 334 times, the fifth highest total in the Big Ten (Ohio State, Michigan, Wisconsin, and MSU). Iowa has been the top-ranked team in the country 11 times.
- Iowa set a school record with 12 wins in 2015. The Hawkeyes won 11 games in 2002 (11-2), and 2009 (11-2). In 2009, Iowa started 9-0 and won 10 regular season games for just the fourth time in school history.
- Iowa won 10 or more games in three consecutive years (2002-04) for the first time in school history.
- Kirk Ferentz has been named Big Ten Coach of the Year four times (2002, 2004, 2009, 2015) and was named National Coach of the Year in 2002 and 2015. Only Michigan's Bo Schembechler (6) has more conference coach of the year honors. Iowa's Hayden Fry and Penn State's Joe Paterno both won the award three times.
- Iowa has had 10 individual national award winners under head coach Kirk Ferentz. They include Brad Banks (2002 Davey O'Brien, Top Quarterback; 2002 Associated Press National Player of the Year); Dallas Clark (2002 Mackey, Top Tight End); Nate Kaeding (2002 Groza, Top Kicker); Robert Gallery (2003 Outland, Top Lineman); Shonn Greene (2008 Doak Walker, Top Running Back); Brandon Scherff (2014 Outland, Top Lineman), Desmond King (2015 Jim Thorpe), Josey Jewell (2017 Lott IMPACT), T.J. Hockenson (2018, Mackey, Top Tight End).
- Iowa's offensive line earned the Joe Moore Award in 2016, an honor bestowed upon the top offensive line unit in the country.
- Iowa's football record in the 2000 decade was 80-45 (.640), a record that ranks as the best decade in Iowa football history, based on total wins. Iowa posted a record of 77-40-4 (.652) during the 1980's and the Hawkeyes were 62-53-2 (.538) in the 1990's. Iowa was 81-49 (.623) from 2010-19.



HAWKEYES IN THE NFL

Iowa football players have a long tradition of being well prepared for professional football following their college playing careers. Since 2010, 42 Hawkeyes have been selected in the NFL Draft. Today, 29 Hawkeyes are on NFL active rosters and five on practice teams.

IOWA FOOTBALL AND THE NFL

- The Hawkeyes have had 188 former players in the NFL since 1999, Kirk Ferentz's first year as head coach (75 draft picks/113 free agents).
At least one Iowa Hawkeye has been selected in every NFL Draft since 1978 (43 consecutive years).
TE T.J. Hockenson (eighth overall, Detroit) and TE Noah Fant (20th overall, Denver) became the first tight ends from the same school to be drafted in the first round of a single NFL Draft (2019).
TE George Kittle (San Francisco) was a first-team All-Pro in 2019. OL Marshal Yanda (Baltimore) was named second-team All-Pro.
DB Desmond King (Los Angeles Chargers), LS Casey Kreiter (Denver), TE George Kittle (San Francisco), and OL Marshal Yanda (Baltimore) were named All-Pro in 2018.
Over the past 19 years, 155-of-180 (88 percent) of Iowa's senior starters have been drafted in the NFL or signed NFL free agent contracts.
Over the past 13 years, Iowa has had 49 NFL Draft picks, tied for third most in the Big Ten -- Ohio State (73), Michigan (55), Wisconsin (49).
Iowa has had seven first round picks in the last 10 NFL drafts -- OL Bryan Bulaga, 2010; DE Adrian Clayborn, 2011; OL Riley Reiff, 2012; OL Brandon Scherff, 2015, TE T.J. Hockenson, TE Noah Fant, 2019; OL Tristan Wirfs, 2020.
Iowa had six players drafted in the 2012 NFL Draft, which tied for the most in the Big Ten and tied for fourth in the country.
Former Hawkeye Marshal Yanda (Baltimore OL) is an eight-time Pro-Bowler (2011-16, 2018, 2019) and was named NFL All-Pro in 2011, 2012, 2014, 2015, 2016, 2018, 2019. He retired following the 2019 season.
In NFL 2011 regular season statistics, former Hawkeye linebackers Chad Greenway (Minnesota) and Pat Angerer (Indianapolis) finished third and fourth, respectively, in tackles. Greenway was named to the Pro Bowl in 2012 and 2013.
Three former Hawkeyes were involved in the 2012 Super Bowl. DB Tyler Sash played for the Super Bowl champion New York Giants, while LB Jeff Tarpinian was on the injured reserve roster of the New England Patriots. Former Iowa center Brian Ferentz, now is his seventh year on staff and first as Iowa's offensive coordinator, was New England's tight ends coach.
Former Iowa DB Sean Considine and OL Marshal Yanda won Super Bowl rings with the 2012 Baltimore Ravens in the 2013 Super Bowl.
Former Iowa LB James Morris (injured reserve) earned a Super Bowl ring with the New England Patriots in 2015. Former TE Tony Moeaki played for the Seattle Seahawks in the same game.
Former center James Ferentz was a member of the 2016 Super Bowl champion Denver Broncos.
Former DT Jonathan Babineaux played for the Atlanta Falcons in Super Bowl LI. Former DE Adrian Clayborn and former DB Charles Godfrey were on the Atlanta injured reserve roster.
Former OL Cole Croston was on the New England Patriots roster in Super Bowl LII. Former C James Ferentz and WR Riley McCarron were on the Patriots practice squad.
Former DL Adrian Clayborn (active), OL James Ferentz, WR Riley McCarron (injured reserve), and OL Cole Croston (practice squad) earned Super Bowl rings as members of the New England Patriots in Super Bowl LIII.
Former LB Anthony Hitchens and LB Ben Niemann played for the Super Bowl champion Kansas City Chiefs in 2020. Former QB C.J. Beathard, TE George Kittle, and OL Ross Reynolds were on the NFC Champion San Francisco 49ers.
Entering the 2020 season, every Iowa senior starting tight end (15) under Kirk Ferentz has been drafted in the NFL or signed by an NFL team. The NFL has employed 17 Iowa tight ends since 1999 (11 drafted/6 free agents).
All 11 members of Iowa's starting defensive unit in 2008 were either drafted or signed to NFL free agent contracts following the draft.
